

## Summer Exercises

The El Retiro summer began with a flourish from June 6 to 11. 73 Jesuit and lay partners in ministry from almost all of the apostolates of the California Province gathered for our third Province Partners' Retreat. We reflected together on our shared call, exploring the theme "Why Were We Chosen?: Grace that Binds Us in Ministry."

Each day of our silent retreat included a thematic presentation in the morning, a conversation on some aspect of Ignatian prayer in the afternoon, and Eucharist celebrated together. Morning prayer and a variety of evening prayer services rounded out the communal aspect of the days. The presenters and presiders came from a wide range of our ministries—and other Catholic ministries, as well—providing a rich breadth of

perspective on our Ignatian vision and mission.

Each retreatant also enjoyed the guidance of an individual director through the time of retreat. The directors, lay and Jesuit, were also drawn from the whole range of the ministries of the California Province. This diverse team brought together women and men knowledgeable about and skilled in giving the Exercises and dedicated to (and enthusiastic about) all things Ignatian.

Thirty retreatants then arrived, from all over the U.S. and far beyond, on June 20. They dedicated themselves to making the entire Spiritual Exercises in the framework of the Retreat Center's annual 36-Day Program. Fr. Bob Fabing, S.J., was once again at the helm, assisted by a

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## A Legacy of Care

In 1982, Margaret Flipp faced a decision. She could remain with the Poor Clares in Los Altos—she had entered 23 years before, at age 18—or she could leave to care for her developmentally challenged 49-year-old brother. Her mother had died that year. Her aging father could not meet Joe's needs. She did not want her only sibling to be without family, cared for by an institution only. Margaret decided to leave, but was determined to continue a life of prayer and service.

There were practical considerations. "I had forgotten how to drive," she laughed. She got a license, cobbled together part-time work, and was then hired as a receptionist at a Palo Alto dental building. In 1984, she joined the Retreat Center staff. She helped schedule

activities and took calls for the Jesuit Institute for Family Life, a Jesuit-sponsored counseling service on El Retiro's grounds. "I felt I was really doing something for people," she said.

Margaret observed that El Retiro's serene setting and its focus on reflection had a cousinly relationship to the austere life of prayer she had lived as a nun, reciting the full liturgy of the hours and waking at 12:30 a.m. for Matins. "We Poor Clares had Jesuits conduct our annual eight-day retreats," she recalled.

## An update on JRC financial development

Unlike distributions from a non-Roth IRA to individuals, IRA distributions to El Retiro are not subject to income tax or estate tax. The strategy is attractive to donors who prefer to leave non-taxable assets to individuals and taxable assets to charity. In January 2010, 27 years after leaving the monastery, Flipp reaffirmed her commitment to a life of prayer, service, and virginity, taking vows as a consecrated virgin in the world during a Mass celebrated by Archbishop George Niederauer at the Church of the Nativity, Menlo Park. She told her friends then, "My desire is to be a clear channel of grace for others and to love God with all my heart."

We are honored to list Margaret Flipp among the first members of El Retiro's Legacy Society, recently founded to honor and thank those who have included us in their estate planning. "I chose to name El Retiro in my estate plan," she observed, "because of my regard for the importance of prayer in people's lives and because of the example of Jesuits I have known."

Margaret's bequest is both an expert's endorsement of what she calls "the wonderful spiritual atmosphere at the Retreat Center" and a tax-wise IRA gift. Her estate plan also provides for her brother, Joe, establishing a trust for his benefit should he outlive her, even as she now continues preparing his meals, providing his transportation, and embracing him with a sister's care.

## A Giant of His Generation

After a lifetime of exemplary service to the Church in the Society of Jesus, Fr. Robert L. St. Clair, S.J., died at Sacred Heart Jesuit Center, Los Gatos, on May 12 of this year. Many El Retiro retreatants will remember Fr. St. Clair well, as he spent nine years on the Retreat Center staff, beginning in 1980. He served as Superior and Executive Director from 1982 until, in 1989, he

was called to Los Gatos to serve as Treasurer of the California Province of the Jesuits.

Born in 1928, Fr. St. Clair entered the Society in 1945 and was ordained in 1958. He was soon exercising leadership in the Province, as Rector of Loyola High School in Los Angeles starting in 1964, as Rector of Loyola [Marymount] University from 1969, then as Vice Provincial for Education for the California Province from 1973 to 1979. His solid good judgment and his wise care for the ministry were well proven in each of these important responsibilities.

Fr. St. Clair won wide accolades as a director of preached retreats. At El Retiro, much of his energy went into setting the Retreat Center on a more solid financial foundation. He spent a number of years in patient negotiation that allowed him to sell 12 of El Retiro's 50 acres. The proceeds of that sale were used to address the deferred maintenance of the time and to establish the endowment that remains to this day at the core of the Retreat Center's investments.

dozen individual directors, a generous and wise group of women and men representing Jesuit ministries all across our continent and even in India.

Before and after the thirty days of the Exercises, four noted Jesuit presenters on Ignatian themes, Frs. William Barry, Howard Gray, Stephen Corder, and Julio Giulietti, joined us. The four set the context of the Exercises for the retreatants, sharing their wisdom to help each participant to prepare for and to understand the liberating experience which the Exercises, through the action of God's Spirit, can provide.

During the course of the 36-Day Program, El Retiro also welcomed three groups in succession for silent

retreats of eight days. Many of these retreatants have been regulars at El Retiro, and the largest of the groups included 28 people. The team of seven individual directors, led by Fr. Joe Fice, S.J., tended graciously and well to the spiritual guidance of these faithful friends.

For eight days of early August, 62 Jesuits, most of this Province, nine from elsewhere around the globe, gathered for our annual Province Retreat. Fr. Bernie Bush, S.J., and Sr. Anne Hennessy, C.S.J. (Orange), were the co-presenters. Their topic, *Jesus Christ: The Source and Goal of Our Desiring*, engaged all the participants. The daily presentations were complemented by individual spiritual direction and, of course, daily Eucharist and varied prayer services.

## Prepared for an Ignatian Workout

**F**r. Duc Vu, S.J., is the newest member of the Pastoral Staff of the Jesuit Retreat Center, having joined us at the end of August after his completion of an M.F.A. in Creative Writing begun in 2008. He looks forward to integrating his writing into his ministry, here at El Retiro, of giving the Spiritual Exercises in varied formats and of offering spiritual direction.

Fr. Duc escaped with his younger brother from communist Vietnam in 1980. After eighteen months in various refugee camps in Southeast Asia, they found their way to the United States and settled in Orange County. Fr. Duc graduated from UC Irvine with a B.S. in Computer Science, then worked as a Software Engineer for several companies in Southern California.

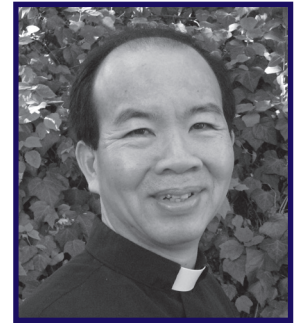
Joining an Ignatian prayer group first brought Fr. Duc into close contact with the Spiritual Exercises, an encounter which culminated in his making the complete Exercises in everyday life, often called a "Nineteenth Annotation" retreat. During this serious time of prayer, he came to the decision to become a priest.

As the oldest son, Fr. Duc bore the responsibility for the wellbeing of his family in Vietnam. He bargained with God that, if priesthood was his call, God would bring his family to the U.S., freeing

him to enter religious life. God kept His side of the bargain, and Fr. Duc did his. The rest of his family arrived in the U.S. in 1990. After two more years of helping his folks, and with their blessings, he entered the Society of Jesus in 1992.

In his training as a Jesuit, Fr. Duc obtained an M.A. in Philosophy, taught Math at Jesuit High School in Sacramento, and earned a Master of Divinity degree. After ordination in 2002, he served at Most Holy Trinity Church in San Jose until 2007. Tertianship (the third year of intensive spiritual formation begun in novitiate) followed, then his profession of Final Vows.

Spirituality, for Fr. Duc, means being in touch with God and with oneself, so that one can live one's life to the fullest. He believes in the unity of the body and the soul, the ups and downs of the one inevitably affecting the other. His mantra, *mens sana in corpore sano* (a sound mind in a sound body), suggests that his interest in exercises is surely not limited to the spiritual.

He joins quite a few of his long-time Jesuit friends there. Fr. Bernie was favored with a prime corner room featuring four huge windows overlooking the Santa Clara Valley.

**Fr. Bob Fabing, S.J.**, is on sabbatical this program year. He can be found in and around Berkeley, where he did his theology studies before ordination. He is living in the community of the Jesuit School of Theology, just north of the U.C. Berkeley campus, and is spending these restful and creative days writing and composing. He and his Jesuit classmates are even now celebrating their fiftieth jubilee of entrance into the Society of Jesus.

**Jack Krouse**, a graduate (2000) of Bellarmine Prep, San Jose, and of Harvard University, Cambridge, served four years as a special assistant for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security in Washington, D.C. Jack spent spring and summer working at El Retiro as an interim member of the Operations Staff. We bade farewell to him a few weeks back as he headed to Culver City to enter the Society of Jesus.

Four other young men joined Jack in entering the Novitiate of the California Province on August 22nd.

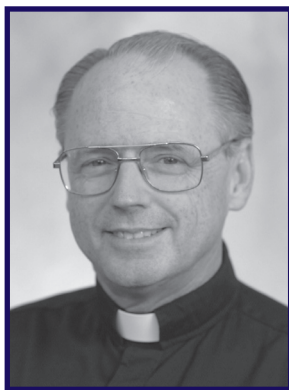
## A Director's Perspective: Sisters and Brothers in Christ

In our latest E-News, I wrote about the recent gathering here of the Jesuit community of the Jesuit School of Theology of Santa Clara University (formerly J.S.T.B.), located in Berkeley. We were glad to host them as they welcomed new members and prepared for the start of the academic year. The global character of the group, representing over 30 provinces of the Society of Jesus and nations the world around, is a sign of hope for the Society and the Church.

John Allen, the astute commentator on matters ecclesial for the National Catholic Reporter, notes often the changing face of the Church, as Catholicism is on the rise in the global South and East but is suffering an evident decline, at least in numbers, in the West—in Europe and North America. The character of our communion has changed more than once over the centuries, and each time the feared “barbarians at the gates” have soon become the pillars of the Church.

Allen also writes regularly of the change in ministry in our day, as a field once the sole turf of the clergy is now shared by lay women and men. Lay candidates preparing for ministry positions in the U.S. (18,000) now far outnumber those preparing for ministry here as priests (5,500.) Every diocese and parish is both blessed and challenged by this trend. The Spirit continues to get the Spirit’s work done, but we don’t always find ourselves open to the creativity of the Creator.

Pope Pius XII published in 1943 his Encyclical *Mystici Corporis Christi*, on the Church as the Mystical Body of Christ. That reflection on the human condition was crafted in the midst of the conflict of World War II. It continues to invite us, in our own conflicted times, to see in the Church, even as it again adapts and develops in response to the invitation of the Spirit, a “divinely-given unity by which all people...are united to Christ in the bond of brotherhood.”

Building on the insights of Aquinas, the early Church Fathers, and the Apostle Paul, Pius called for us to take the divine perspective on humanity that allows us to recognize what he named the “supernatural nobility of the faithful,” a shared, baptismal nobility that transcends race and origin and gender. All of us, Pius noted, are called “to help one another,” working “in mutual collaboration...or the more perfect building up of the whole Body.”

Echoing Sacred Scripture, Pius asked, “How can we claim to love the Divine Redeemer, if we hate those whom He has redeemed with His precious blood, so that He might make them members of His Mystical Body?” Now, just as in 1943, we find ourselves called to love and to care for, to welcome and to honor all people whom God has fashioned and sustains. In every age, we mere mortals seem to have found this call a challenge.

The bishops of the U.S. and the Jesuit provincials of this Assistancy now encourage us, a nation of immigrants, to extend a hand of welcome to many new neighbors, our sisters and brothers, through comprehensive immigration reform. They build on Pius’s call to his contemporaries, “As in the body when one member suffers, all the other members share its pain,...so in the Church the individual members do not live for themselves alone, but also help their fellows.”

The bishops and provincials—and, indeed, Pope Benedict XVI—encourage us, a diverse community of the baptized, to extend a hand of welcome also to a new age of Church ministers, our sisters and brothers, women and men whose roots and culture are often different from our own and whose ways of commitment to a life of ministry often differ from those we consider traditional.

Ever creative, the Spirit continues to build up the Body of Christ.

## St. Joseph's Corner

The Buildings and Grounds team here at the Retreat Center remains as busy—and as creative—as ever, balancing their responsibilities for maintenance, for improvements, and for preparing gathering spaces for our retreatants and other guests. Dozens of projects have benefited from their attention over recent months, each project adding to the beauty and comfort, adaptability and reliability of El Retiro's acres and buildings and systems.

The gift of three electrically-adjustable beds led to renovations of the Retreat Center's two fully handicap-accessible retreatant rooms in Loyola Hall. None of the locations these beds were to occupy was convenient to an electrical outlet. That lack was quickly remedied, though not without tearing open a few walls. The project gave the team occasion to make a number of other upgrades in each room, including the addition of a large ceiling fan in room 10.

When St. Francis Hall was still home to the Wellman family, they enjoyed a billiard room at the north end and on a lower level. The Jesuits promptly expanded this room to provide El Retiro's first chapel, reversing the expansion once Rossi Chapel was completed. Decades of the room's disuse and underuse followed. Some simple renovations have now provided

a versatile and popular space. Groups of up to ten meet at a round table, spiritual directors and directees converse in a quiet corner, and musicians rehearse at a baby grand of venerable age.

The El Retiro phone system, not quite as venerable as the baby grand, was unable to provide enough extensions to meet the Retreat Center's needs and was beyond effective maintenance and reliability. A retreatant's generosity has paved the way for our installation of a new system, just completed, that will cut our phone bill in half, minimize our concerns about system reliability, and facilitate our continuing to serve our constituents well and to complete our mission.
