

How might we experience Mary as her companions? What might her own words teach us if we imagine we are walking by her side, living in her village, walking with her to Synagogue, reading the prophets? Did you know Mary is often shown in early paintings with a book in her hands? She was educated. Her faith was lived. Follow the movements of your own heart with the images that beckon you into Mary's presence and lead you deeper into your own heart. Pray with her.






The Annunciation: "Hail, favored one!" (Luke 1:26-38)

Imagine Mary, surprised by the Angel Gabriel: "Hail, favored one! The Lord is with you." Imagine her youth, purity of heart, her complete trust: Mary asks the Angel, "how is it happening in my life?" The Angel replies: "Do not be afraid, Mary, the Lord is with you." And Mary says, Yes. "Be it done unto me according to your word." Read Luke slowly, allowing the words to penetrate.....linger on the words that stir your heart. Return to them during the first week. God desires to make possible the redemption of the whole human race, and "The word is made flesh and dwells among us."






The Visitation (Luke 1:39-80)

Mary has learned from the Angel Gabriel that her cousin, Elizabeth, is also pregnant. She and hastens to be with her, walking several arduous days up into the hill country of Judea. "When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and filled with the Holy Spirit, she cried out in a loud voice: Most blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb." What is Mary's response? "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God, my Savior." Read The Magnificat (Luke 2: 46-55). What words become your own prayer of thanksgiving and joy?






Ponder the words of contemporary Dutch priest, Henry Nouwen: "I find the meeting of these two women very moving. Mary's visit made Elizabeth aware of what she was waiting for. The child in her womb leaped for joy. They affirmed for each other that something was happening worth waiting for. They create a community of support, celebration, and affirmation. The visit of Elizabeth and Mary is one of the Bible's most beautiful expressions of what it means to form community."

The Nativity (Luke 2:1-7)

Mary and Joseph set out for the City of David called Bethlehem to enroll in the census. Imagine the journey. Travel with them. Notice the details and specifics of the journey. Ignatius imaged a servant girl was accompanying them, one who would help Mary in her time of need. "While they were there, the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to her first-born son. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because there was no room in the inn." A scene like no other, they are now a family enfolded in a manger. Are you there? Listen to - Mary, Did You Know?





Joseph, faithful, ever watchful, a provider, accepting, kind. What other qualities of character do you notice? He too is chosen. Reassured by the Angel Gabriel, he takes Mary into his home. Together they await the unknown mysteries ahead of them. Spend time with Joseph. Imagine his questions and the depth of his own faith. What must he do to keep Mary and Jesus safe and provide for them? What is his gift to Jesus?

*The Rosary Path presents three sets of events from the life of Jesus and Mary. The slow and gentle prayer walk allows us to contemplate how they experienced joys, sorrows and glories and brings us into communion with these sacred mysteries. With each step and each whispered prayer, we realize how very near they are to us. Jesus, may we, this Advent, be drawn ever more completely into the wonderful journey of Your life until we see that Your life has become the pattern of our lives.



For some of us as we walk the trails of the Retreat Center, we have experienced that Jesus walks at our side. He joins us as He joined humanity at his Birth. It is a great consolation to know that He so willingly, so lovingly, unites with us and matches His steps to our steps. This Advent, Jesus, help us to sense how closely You walk with us through our days. Let us walk with You.

Many of us have walked the labyrinth at the Center. Our experience may vary between one person and another, from one time of walking it to another. But almost always we become more conscious of the ways our lives take many unexpected turns, of the ways that God is always ahead of us and somewhat unpredictable in what is sent our way. Jesus holds our lives preciously in His hands and guides us. We are given the chance of abandoning ourselves into this union with Jesus who leads in the many twists and turns of our lives. Jesus, this Advent, may we find peace in a trust that unites us to you as we walk through the lights and shadows of our lives.




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
